



A BRIEF GUIDE TO COMMON CEMETERY SYMBOLS

Anchor Christian hope (Christ as anchor of stability).

Bird Soul, child burial.

Book Bible; book of recording angel, doomsday book, book of heaven; divine knowledge.

Column, broken Death, interruption of life (column can be either broken or cut short).

Compass & Right-Angle Indicates member of the Masons or "Freemason" fraternal group.

"Consort" A wife who died before her husband.

Cross & Crown Hope of salvation; victory of soul.

Dove Christian constancy; devotion; soul - usually flying upwards; holy spirit with olive branch; Noah's Dove-of-Promise that told him the waters had receded.

Drapery Mourning; depicts funeral drapery (palls); portal/window opening/closing into the otherworld.

Enclosures of a cemetery plot Victorian guarded sense of family; distinguish family from community.

Evergreen Plants Immortal soul.

Fans Sometimes depicts wings or sunset/sunrise, but usually just ornament in corners.

Flower(s) Human life is like the blooming and dying of a flower. If pointed downward or stem broken: support of life has been broken; innocent life cut short.

Gates Biblical image of the gates of heaven.

Globe One true God with dominion.

Grapes Food of communion; symbol of Christ.

Hand(s), upward Pointing towards heaven; God's hand.

Hand(s), downward Death before baptism.

Hand, infant's/child's Infant or child burial.

Hands, clasped Love and friendship are stronger than death; farewell; marriage.

Headstone Portal into the otherworld - often depicted as arched.

Heart Human affection and love (typically German; usually a two-lobed turnip shape).

Ivy Friendship; fidelity; immortal soul.

Lamb Child's grave; Christian (flock of Christ); Christ as the Lamb of God.

Lily Purity.

Logs See "Tree."

Morning Glory Death of a child.

Oak Leaf Strength; Christian constancy.

Obelisk Points the way to heaven (from Egypt).

Palm Victory over death.

Patterns, geometric or abstract Decorative (typically German).

Pinwheel a.k.a. Compass Star: a cross; the sun; eternity; talisman (typically German).

Plant, odd-looking see "Tree-of-Life."

"Relic" A wife whose husband died before her

River Course of life.

Rose Beauty; womanhood.

Scroll, unfolding Future life in heaven; one end is the past/earthly life and other the future - life is nothing more than the unrolling of a scroll.

Shell, scallop Resurrection; rebirth (from use as a ladle in baptizing); may also be a Sunburst.

Star, five-point Member of the "Grand Army of the Republic" Civil War veterans group.

Stump Life ended.

Sun, rising Resurrection of the soul after death.

Sun, setting End of life.

Sunburst Life and renewal (could also be a Fan or Scallop Shell).

Swastika Cross; the sun; eternity (a.k.a. "fylfot;" typically German, long before infamous misuse in WWII).

Tree Biblical Tree-of-Life; nature. Also sticks, twigs and logs used as enframement.

Tree, large/old Adult or elder - size of tree often indicates age (typically German).

Tree, Oak Strength; Christian constancy.

Tree, lopsided One partner in a marriage died earlier.

Tree, seedling Infant or child (typically German).

Tree-of-Life Cycle of birth, growth, decay, death, rebirth (image from Garden of Eden; lower two branches usually drooping; and often growing from Um or Heart).

Trefoil or Triad Christian trinity of God.

Tulip Life; love; immortality (typically German).

Urn Death of an adult.

Urn, with flame New life associated with death: rebirth, life in heaven; soul rising to heaven.

Vase Water of life - often with Tree-of-Life.

Wheat Fruitfulness; death of an older adult.

Willow, weeping Mourning (drooping symbolizes sorrow); resurrection (lives on streams, symbols of life). Often in a classical image of a mourning woman leaning on a funeral urn under a weeping willow.

Wings Flight to heaven.

Wreath Crown of victory.

ROSS COUNTY'S CEMETERIES

Burial grounds are sacred spaces, and should be treated with respect. Their old monuments to the deceased are historical objects and irreplaceable documents that deserve special care.

Preparing for America's Bicentennial, the Ohio Genealogical Society asked local genealogical groups to provide the locations of their area's cemeteries and burials.

This information was exhaustively sought out by the Ross County Genealogical Society and was published in *Ohio Cemeteries* and its updates. Locally, it was included in the *Bicentennial Atlas of Ross County* and is archived at the genealogical society's library.

The cemetery locations were added to the county engineer's map at the same time in order to aid researchers and visitors, and any additions or corrections are welcomed by the department.

Many cemeteries are known by different names and spellings. Many smaller, older graveyards have been abandoned and their burials moved into later, larger cemeteries. Several single burials and loose gravestones are not indicated.

Through more than two centuries of history, the people of Ross County have created more than 300 cemeteries and isolated burials. Time, forgetfulness, and vandalism have hidden, damaged, and destroyed many. Some shown on the map are lost or no longer exist, and some are not marked on the map. Most of those that remain need care and investigation to preserve their fragile history.
